



What is ORCID?

Open Researcher and Contributor ID (ORCID) is a free, unique, persistent identifier (PID) for researchers, scholarly authors, and innovators. It is a unique 16-digit number with an associated record (sometimes called a profile) that stores automatic links to all your research.

Benefits of having an ORCID

- » **Unified records and name flexibility:** You can use the same ID throughout your whole career, even if your name changes or you move to a different organization, discipline, or country.
- » **Improved discoverability:** ORCID is indexed by Google Scholar, and you can also link it to the author systems used in key databases like Web of Science and Scopus.
- » **Make getting recognition for your work easier:** Reduce the burden on researchers by allowing them to draw information from their ORCID record to auto-populate standard fields in the proposal submission form. Also by allowing trusted organizations to add your research information to your ORCID record, you can spend more time conducting your research and less time managing it.



Creating an ORCID account

Researchers can apply for an ORCID free of charge using a simple registration form on the orcid.org website. This process takes only 1 minute.
